The Major in Psychology

32 credits, including 100, 240, 246, and 300; 4 credits of electives at each of the 200-, 300-, and 400-levels; one Senior Inquiry from 452, 454, 458, or 466; and 2 additional credits of electives at any level. Experiential coursework (382, 385, 490, internships) cannot satisfy the 200-, 300-, or 400-level elective requirement, but can satisfy the 2 additional electives requirement.

Students may not major or minor in both Psychology and Neuroscience. Students intending to apply to graduate school in psychology should consult with their advisors for further recommendations.

Note: Enrollments in 240 and 246 are controlled by the department. Students interested in these courses should contact their PSYC advisor or, if not yet assigned to one, the department's administrative assistant, Kara Meyer (karameyer@augustana.edu), as soon as possible to secure a seat.

Major Overview

Students have the opportunity to gain clinical experience in a community placement as a component of a PSYC 490 experience coordinated within the department. They also have the option of engaging in research studies through PSYC 382. Some recent graduates were so successful in their clinical placements, they were hired full-time after graduation.

Recent graduates are employed by Family Resources social services agency, Quad Cities Autism Center, Peace Corps, and AmeriCorps. They are teaching English in Asia and working as substance abuse

counselors, college admissions counselors, behavioral health technicians, and public aid advocates. Others work in sales, marketing, and human resources.

Recent graduates have completed PhDs in cognitive, clinical, social, and quantitative psychology, and behavioral neuroscience; and Master's degrees in counseling, industrial organizational, social work, and political science. Others have gone on to law and medical schools, nursing, and physical and occupational therapy.
